"Cervical Cancer Screening and Prevention," issued by ACOG in October 2016, provides a review of the best available evidence for cervical cancer screening. The guideline covers cervical cytology screening techniques (Pap test or Pap smear) and test reporting, and human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccination and testing.

Cervical Cancer Screening - ACOG  
The guidelines generally advise a reduction in the number of tests women get over their lifetime to better ensure that they receive the benefits of testing while minimizing the harms, and include a preference for co-testing using the Pap test and HPV test for women age ages 30 to 65.

Current Cervical Carcinoma Screening Guidelines
