For lay rescuers trained in chest compression only CPR, it is

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recommended that they provide chest compression only CPR for adults in CPR. For lay rescuers trained in CPR using chest compressions and ventilation, rescue breaths, it is reasonable to provide ventilation, rescue breaths, and chest compressions for the adult in OHCA.

The Revised AHA CPR Guidelines: C-A-B. Chest Compressions. Start by placing the heel of one hand in the center of the chest and place your other hand on top of the first. Push down hard and fast, at the rate of about 100 compressions per minute. Perform 30 compressions and then proceed to the next step. Airway. Open airway with a head tilt-chin lift.

The new guidelines do not have any major changes, but here are some of the basics: No more than 120 compressions per minute with a minimum of 100. Chest compressions for adults should be no more than 2.4 inches and at least 2 inches.

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
