Briefly, the anticipation guide is designed to introduce a chapter or lesson and cause readers to focus their attention on the topic that is to come. The readers' previous thoughts and opinions about the concept are activated by their responses to a series of statements about the topic.

Anticipation Guide - STRATEGIES

Anticipation Guide. This comprehension strategy activates students' prior knowledge, builds curiosity about a new topic before learning about it, and then checks for understanding after the topic is presented.

Sample of "Anticipation Guide" For Science

The Anticipation Guides strategy asks students to express their opinions about ideas before they encounter them in a text or unit of study. Completing anticipation guides helps students recognize and connect to themes that surface in their learning. Use this strategy at the beginning of a unit or before engaging with a text.

Anticipation Guide Form

An anticipation guide is a comprehensions strategy that is used before reading to activate students' prior knowledge and build curiosity about a new topic. Before reading, students listen to or read several statements about key concepts presented in the text; they're often structured as a series of statements with which the students can choose to agree or disagree.

An Anticipation Guide is a series of questions or statements related to the topic or point of view of a particular text. Students work silently to read and then agree or disagree with each statement.

Though an anticipation guide works well as pre- and post-reading activity, it can be applied to any learning experience. Use with video or film presentations, guest speakers, or field trips to help focus students' attention on key learning goals.
