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Proof. We must prove that A ⇒ B and B ⇒ A. The first statement means x = 7m + 1. So let x = 7m. Then, for some m ∈ Z, x = 7m + 1. But 7m + 1 = 7(m + 1) − 6, and so we can set n = m + 1, which gives x = 7n − 6; thus x = 7n − 6. This proves A ⇒ B.

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The statement "if -then | " might be true but not obvious; the question is how you get from -to |. That journey is called a proof of the statement " if -then |. " It means: You begin by assuming -, You notice that, since -is true, -0must also be true. This, in turn, makes it clear to you that -0must be true.

Methods of Proof (Solutions)
We start with the language of Propositional Logic, where the rules for proofs are very straightforward. Adding sets and quantifiers to this yields First-Order Logic, which is the language of modern mathematics. Being able to do proofs in this setting is the main skill necessary for success in advanced mathematics.

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The Art of Proof is divided into two parts, The Discrete--dealing with integers, induction, modular arithmetic and algorithms--and The Continuous--dealing with real and rational numbers and with countability. The authors assume/hope/recommend that these two parts will be given equal time in the course.

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9.A famous conjecture that is thought to be true (but for which no proof is known) is the Twin Prime conjecture. A pair of primes is said to be twin if they differ by 2. For example, 11 and 13 are twin primes, as are 431 and 433. The Twin Prime conjecture states that there are an infinite number of such twins. Definition 1.1 An ordered pair is a list (x, y) of two things x and y, enclosed in parentheses and separated by a comma. For example (2, 4) is an ordered pair, as is (4, 2).
