Charles Perkins' main contribution to Australian history was the Freedom Rides. The first ever Freedom Ride was on the 12th of February 1965, when thirty university students, known as the "Student Action for Aboriginals", boarded a bus to fight for better treatment for Aboriginal people in the rural New South Wales.

Charles Perkins (1936 to 2000) Source: Smoke Signals, April 1966. Charles Perkins was born in Alice Springs; his mother was Arrente and his father Kalkadoon. He was removed from the Alice Springs Telegraph Station Aboriginal Reserve when he was 10 and educated at St Francis House, a school established by Father Percy Smith in Adelaide to educate Aboriginal boys.

The white people were infuriated by the protests of the Freedom Riders. They hated their guts to stand up to them, and then picket. Typical reactions to the protests was the throwing of rotten eggs and tomatoes, and bottles at the Freedom Riders. the reaction was far stretched when a grazier's son rammed the Freedom Rides bus off the road when it was leaving Walgett in the middle of the night.

### Freedom Ride, 1965 - Indigenous Rights

Inspired by the Freedom Riders of the American Civil Rights Movement, students from the University of Sydney formed a group called the Student Action for Aborigines, led by Charles Perkins (the first Indigenous Australian to graduate tertiary education) among others, and travelled into New South Wales country towns on what some of them considered a fact-finding mission.

Charles Perkins was the first Aboriginal to graduate from university and was also one of the most controversial of indigenous leaders. As a leading activist and bureaucrat, his passionate and occasionally combative stance earned many admirers as well as enemies.

### Freedom Rides - Charles Perkins and the Freedom Rides

In 1965, Charles Perkins led the Freedom Ride, a trip to western New South Wales that drew attention to the rife racism and poor living conditions experienced by Aboriginal people.

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
