The De Anima is a discussion of the main problems connected with the soul or vital principle of living things: what it is, how it is related to the body, and how it functions. The approach is more metaphysical and the treatment more abstract than might have been expected from a biologist; indeed Aristotle does not seem to have contributed much to the subject from his own observation.

On the Soul. On the Soul (Greek ????? ?????, Peri Psych?s; Latin De Anima) is a major treatise written by Aristotle c. 350 BC. Although its topic is the soul, it is not about spirituality but rather a work in what might best be described as biopsychology, a description of the subject of psychology within a biological framework.

Aristotle on the Soul

Democritus roundly identifies soul and mind, for he identifies what appears with what is true-that is why he commends Homer for the phrase 'Hector lay with thought distraught'; he does not employ mind as a special faculty dealing with truth, but identifies soul and mind.

Aristotle's Theory of Soul

In De Anima, he sought to set out his theory of the soul as the ultimate reality of embodied form and produced both a masterpiece of philosophical insight and a psychology of perennially fascinating subtlety.

In short, philosophers themselves, and medical men, even when it is their purpose to discourse about the mind, do in every instance inscribe on their title-page 91 and table of contents, 92 "De Anima" ("A treatise on the soul"). And that you may also have God's voucher on the subject, it is the soul which He addresses; it is the soul which He exhorts and counsels, to turn the mind and intellect to Him.

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
