Frontal Fibrosing Alopecia - Dermatology Advisor

Frontal fibrosing alopecia usually presents as a uniform linear band of hair loss along the front and sides of the scalp hair margin, resulting in a receding frontal hair line. Atypical patterns of loss include a diffuse zig-zag pattern, a pseudo-fringe- sign , or continuous involvement all the way around the hair margin both front and back.

DISCUSSION. Frontal fibrosing alopecia (FFA) is a form of hair loss most often seen in postmenopausal Caucasian women. In a recent multicenter review of 355 patients with FFA, 98.5% were Caucasian, 97% were women, and 86% of the women were postmenopausal (Vañó-Galván et al., 2014).This has led some to suggest an androgen-driven cause hypothesis, but currently, the etiology is unknown.

Frontal fibrosing alopecia (figure 25) A type of lichen planus; Most common in post-menopausal women but can affect other age groups and rarely men; Hair loss first affects the arms and legs, sometimes years before the eyebrows and then the scalp

Physical examination revealed frontal and temporal hair loss, with associated “lonely hairs,” perifollicular erythema, and scaling. Loss of eyebrow hair, depression of temporal and frontal veins, and numerous yellow papules on the forehead and temples were also noted . Frontal fibrosing alopecia presents as a progressive symmetric band-like alopecia, affecting the frontal hair line, the preauricular scalp and, less commonly and distinctively, the retroauricular areas.

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
