DEVIANCE AND SOCIAL CONTROL. Overview: Every culture has norms that establish expectations about what types of behavior are appropriate for particular people in certain social situations. When a person violates a norm, members of society respond by recognizing the act as deviant. However, no act is inherently deviant; other people as deviant from a norm must first define it.
