There are five main kinds of verbs in French: regular -ER, -IR, -RE; stem-changing; and irregular. Once you've learned the rules of conjugation for each of the first three kinds

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of verbs, you should have no problem conjugating regular verbs in each of those categories. The majority of French verbs are regular -ER verbs.

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The vast majority of verbs that end in -er follow this pattern; the only exceptions are aller and stem-changing verbs. * French grammarians consider that there are three types of verbs. ** These verbs have one small irregularity in the spelling of certain conjugations – learn more.

Another most frequently used French verb is “voir” which means, to see. Aside from its literal use though, voir can also be used figuratively as in “to understand” or “to experience”. It all depends on the context

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and usage. Here it is, conjugated in the present tense.

French Regular -RE Verb Conjugation: To conjugate an -RE verb in the present tense, remove the infinitive ending and then add the appropriate endings. For example, here are the present tense conjugations for the regular -RE verbs descendre (to descend), perdre (to lose), and vendre (to sell):

Pronoun: Ending: descendre > descend-perdre > perd-vendre > vend-

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
