Levels of Neonatal Care | American Academy of Pediatrics

For states and hospitals who use this classification, a level 4 NICU is an intensive care unit that can care for babies as young as 22 to 24 weeks gestational age. The term "micro-preemies" is used to describe babies born between 22 and 26 weeks of gestation or smaller than 1 pound 13 ounces.

The high-risk neonate is a newborn who has encountered an event in prenatal, perinatal, or postnatal life that leads to a high probability of manifesting a physiological or psychological deficit that requires admission to a neonatal intensive care unit (NICU). Complications requiring a NICU admission can occur in premature and term infants.

In general, care in this setting should be limited to newborn infants who are more than 32 weeks' gestational age and weigh more than 1500 g at birth or who are recovering from serious illness treated in a level III (subspecialty) NICU. Level II units are differentiated into 2 categories, IIA and IIB, on the basis of their ability to provide assisted ventilation.
