African literature is literature of or from Africa and includes oral literature. As George Joseph notes in his chapter on African literature in *Understanding Contemporary Africa*, whereas European views of literature often stressed a separation of art and content, African awareness is inclusive: "Literature" can also simply mean an artistic use of words for the sake of art alone.
