Lacan counters such objections by pointing out that there are two words in German for "thing": das Ding and die Sache. It is the latter term which Freud usually employs to refer to the thing-presentations in the unconscious , and Lacan argues that although on one level Sachvorstellungen and Wortvorstellungen are opposed, in the symbolic level "they go together".
