Lucretius regarded him as the spiritual savior of mankind. Epicureanism was a missionary philosophy, aiming to give man happiness by making him self-sufficient. Its key teachings included: Study science in order to rid yourself of unnecessary fears, especially of the gods and death. Sensation is the basis of all knowledge.

On The Nature of Things is sweeping in scope and detail, but in the end it is essentially a presentation of the Epicurean method for answering the most common and troubling questions about the nature of life and of the universe. Lucretius develops his argument in great detail, but gives minimal introduction to the method of his approach.
