So on to planting your potatoes; plant potato seeds in a trench at the depth of about 3 inches for small potatoes and 5 inches for larger maincrop. Sprinkle some blood and bone fertilizer at the bottom and sides of the trench, layer with seaweed or comfrey, and plant the seeds with the chitted shoots facing up.

And, unlike regular potatoes, sweet potatoes don't want to be hilled during the growing season. So, if you're building a tall potato barrel, it might be better to save the potato barrels for your potatoes, and then grow your sweets in a regular container that's ideally 18-inches or larger in diameter, and at least 12 inches deep.

You will need... 1. Choose a good sized container, checking that it has several drainage holes in the bottom. 2. Space potatoes about 30cm (1ft) apart, with most sprouts on each potato facing upwards. 3. Cover potatoes with multi-purpose compost until the container is about half full, then water.

About five weeks after planting, you should "hill" your potatoes. Simply pile soil around the stems. This forces new potatoes to grow to grow about the seed potatoes. It is ok to leave a few of the upper leaves exposed or to cover the entire plant. Be sure to hill often enough so that the new tubers aren't exposed to direct sun.

### *How to... Grow Your Own Potatoes*

*Seed potatoes will grow well if the sprouts growing from the eyes are no more than 1/2-inch long. In other words, if there are no sprouts or short sprouts, then you are good to go. To prevent your seed potatoes from sprouting, keep them in a cool, dry and dark place away from other fruits and vegetables.*

*Planting your seed potatoes in the ground. Once you have your seed potatoes, expose them to some light (avoid direct sunlight) and let the shoots grow to 1 cm long. If you're lucky enough to have space, dig trenches that measure about 30 - 40cm wide and 10 - 20cm deep.*
