The entire second half of *Scenes of Subjection* describes the elaborate burdens of freedom imposed on ex-slaves, and the reign of terror in the wake of slavery. Hartman's main argument is that emancipation did not do away with racial subjection; instead, the nominal extension of rights to freedmen was simply a point of transition between different manifestations or modes of subjection.
