Although Mary never came to Hardwick Hall, Bess and her husband became her caretakers during her imprisonment by Elizabeth I until her execution. Hardwick is also home to some of the best early embroidery in the country – in particular the set of embroideries known as the noble women which were made while Bess was living at Chatsworth and were made from pieces of velvet,

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silk and cloth of gold.

The award-winning 'Threads of Time' exhibition tells visitors the...

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As well as fine tapestries Hardwick also has some of the finest early embroidery in the country, not least in the large scale set of embroideries known as 'the noble women'. This is a set of four (originally five) hangings that all take their subject matter from worthy heroines and their virtues.

The embroideries in our collection were produced between 1569 and about 1585, the years in which Mary lived in the custody of George Talbot, Sixth Earl of Shrewsbury (a wealthy Protestant). Mary was moved around Talbot's various country properties and although she wasn't kept in a cell – she had a large domestic staff, well-furnished

**The Embroideries At Hardwick Hall
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**Hardwick Hall was built by Bess of
Hardwick, Countess of Shrewsbury.
She was the daughter of a country
squire, and was born at his small
manor house, the "Old" Hardwick**

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Hall in the mid-1520s. Bess had great intelligence and ambition, and was married four times. Each time she married, she improved her circumstances until she became one of the richest women in England.

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
