The Pleasures of the Imagination remaps the cultural topography of England by situating the visual and performing arts and print culture at the center rather than the periphery of eighteenth-century experience. Brewer argues persuasively that the modern notion of high culture was an eighteenth-century invention that brought about profound transformations in attitudes, ideas, markets, and institutions (xv-xix).
