Rifleman Thomas Plunkett of the 1st Battalion, 95th Rifles, shot the French General Auguste François-Marie de Colbert-Chabanais at a range of up to 800 yards (730 m) at the Battle of Cacabelos on 3 January 1809. The 1st battalion was part of John Moore's campaign which ended with evacuation after the Battle of Corunna on 16 January 1809.
